Blowing out eternal pain

This mini-workshop provides an open platform for an inter- and trans-generation conversation that looks at how injury inflicted by oppressive regimes is managed by those directly affected, and its inter and trans-generational effect. While cultural norms and taboos may limit such conversations, the methodology of facilitators Shirley and Haroon, a mother and son couple that experienced South African apartheid brutality, prompts reflection among participants to dig deeper into their own lives, momentarily, to begin a journey of facing silences and coping mechanisms common to survivors and to open doors previously locked for healing and disrupting transfer of trauma on the basis of increased empathy, awareness and understanding.

Meet the Facilitators



Tehani Chitty is a dramatherapist and actor. She is a graduate in Drama and Movement Therapy (MA), Royal Central School of Speech and Drama, London. Tehani currently practices as a therapist. Her client groups include children with emotional and behavioural difficulties, adults with anxiety and those who have experienced trauma. She also works as an actor with Mind Adventures Theatre Company.



Shimali Perera (née Goonetilleke) is a Registered Art Psychotherapist of ANZATA (Australian and New Zealand Arts Therapy Association). Her clientele are adults and children who have experienced trauma due to physical, sexual, emotional abuse and neglect, and as well as those experiencing depression. Shimali has also conducted talks and art therapy experiential workshops for counsellors, professionals in the co-operate sector, teachers, children, and the general public in both Sri Lanka and overseas.



Sunil Wijesiriwardena is a literary critic, university lecturer, playwright, translator and longstanding civic leader in Sri Lanka. He researches and teaches in areas of cultural-studies and transformative education (cultural fluency, conflict transformation, peacebuilding, eco-spiritual politics and engaged religions). Sunil was the Founder – Director of Vibhavi - the first Independent Cultural Institute in Sri Lanka. He was one of the artists who initiated the 2015 civic movement to draft a National Cultural Policy for Sri Lanka and is currently Joint-Chairperson of the Arts and Cultural Policy Desk.



Shirley Gunn is director of the Human Rights Media Centre, which is a member of South African Coalition for Transitional Justice. She was actively involved in the South African liberation struggle and was a member of the political and military underground movement of the African National Congress. She was detained in solitary confinement for lengthy periods in 1985 and again in 1990 with her baby son, Haroon. In 1996, Shirley testified to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and she and Haroon were found to be victims of gross human rights violations. She is now active with the Khulumani Support Group for victims of apartheid violence and torture.



Haroon Gunn-Salie's multidisciplinary collaborative art practice translates community oral histories into artistic interventions and installations. He completed his BA Hons in sculpture at the University of Cape Town's Michaelis School of Fine Art in 2012. Significant exhibitions and projects include: Making Africa: A Continent of Contemporary Design, Vitra Design Museum, and Guggenheim Museum Bilbao (2015, 2016); What Remains is Tomorrow, the South African Pavilion at La Biennale di Venezia (2015); and the 19° Festival de Arte Contemporânea SESC_Videobrasil (2015).



S. Maunaguru is a theatre practitioner and scholar from Batticaloa, Sri Lanka. He is best known as a proponent and innovator of the Kooththu form of traditional Tamil theatre. Prof. Maunaguru has taught both at the University of Jaffna and the Eastern University of Sri Lanka, where he produced and directed many plays with his colleagues and students. He was Professor of Fine Arts at the Eastern University of Sri Lanka until 2009, and is a former Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Head of the Swami Vipulananda Institute of Aesthetic Studies of the Eastern University.



Gabriele Uelsberg, PhD in history of art, is the Director of LVR-LandesMuseum in Bonn, the state museum of Rhineland, Germany. Dr. Uelsberg is a member of several advisory boards and holds curator ships at places such as the Ludwig Museum in Budapest, Hungary and the Society for Numismatics in Bonn. She has served as a member of the Board of Trustees of Friedrich-Wilhelm University Bonn and has, for the past six years been a member of the steering committee of the German Union of Museums: she is currently the chairwoman of the Citizens' Foundation of the Persecuted Arts in Solingen, Germany.
